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IQVIA surveyed 720 HCPs in six countries on the effect of the pandemic on themselves and the healthcare system

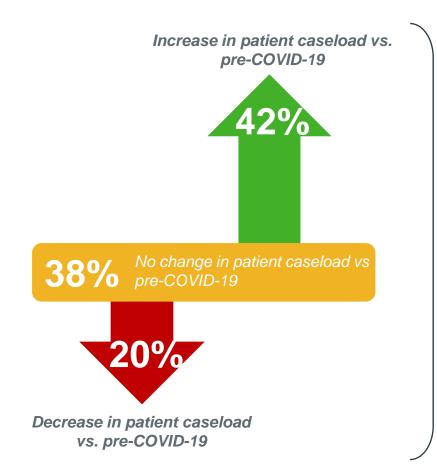

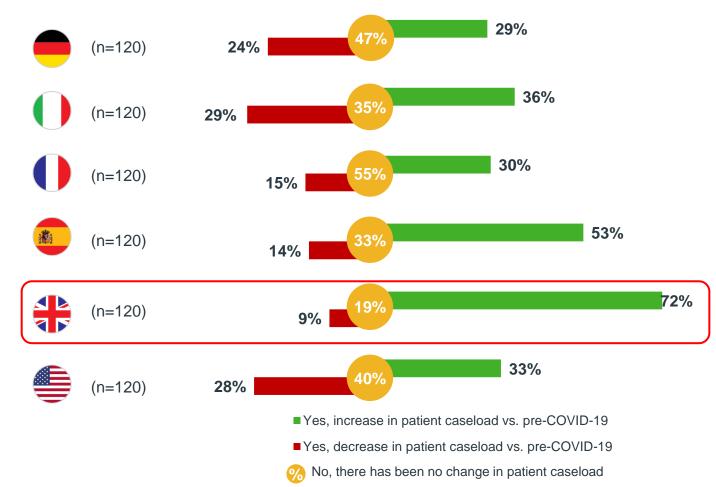

Change in patient caseload vs. pre-COVID-19 (% of HCPs)



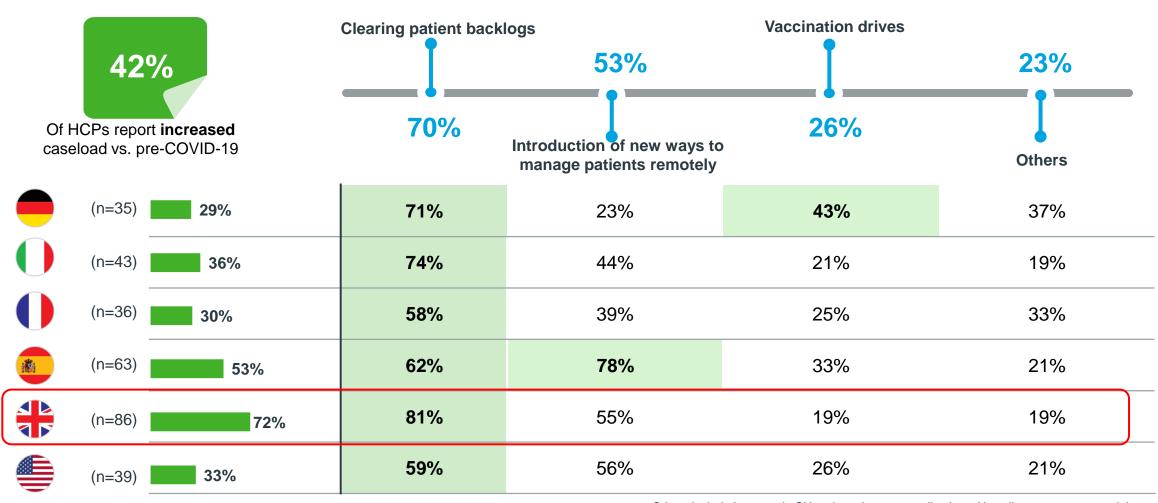

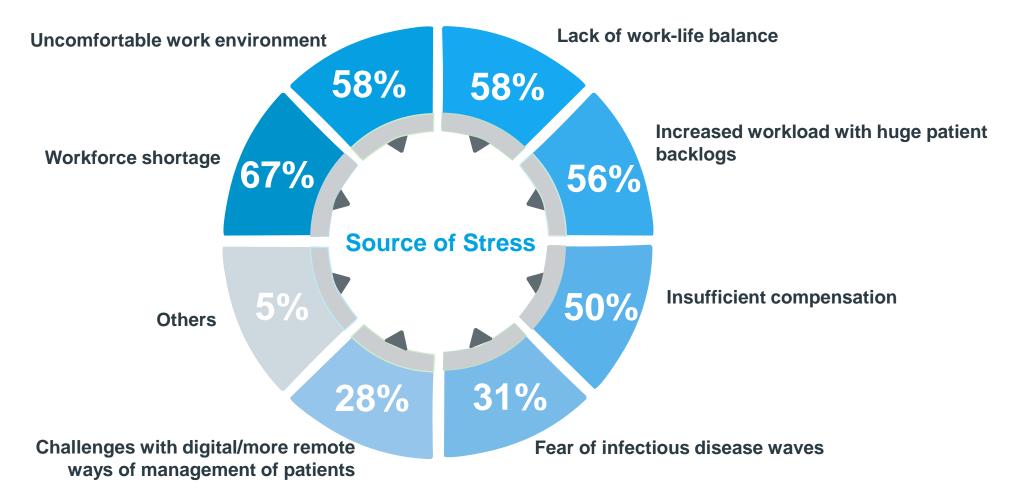

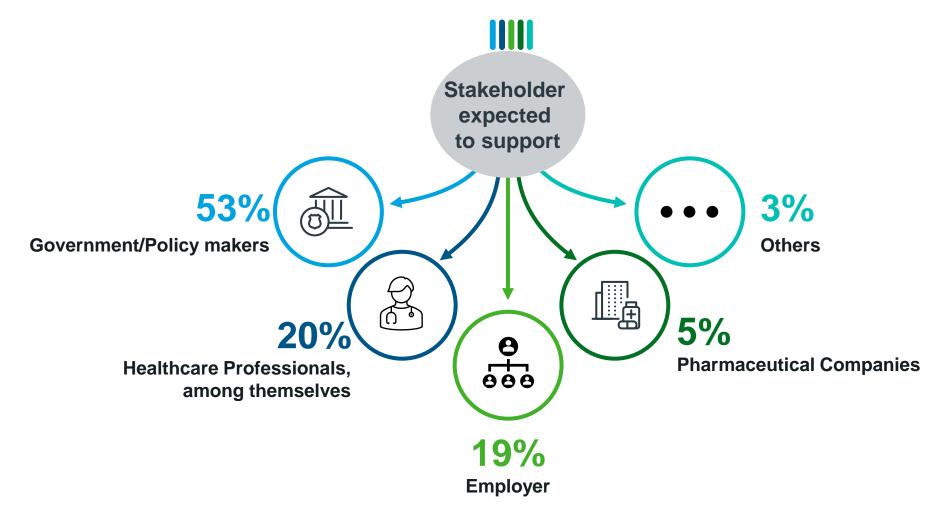

In the UK, HCPs primarily expect support from government and policy makers which is in line with other European countries

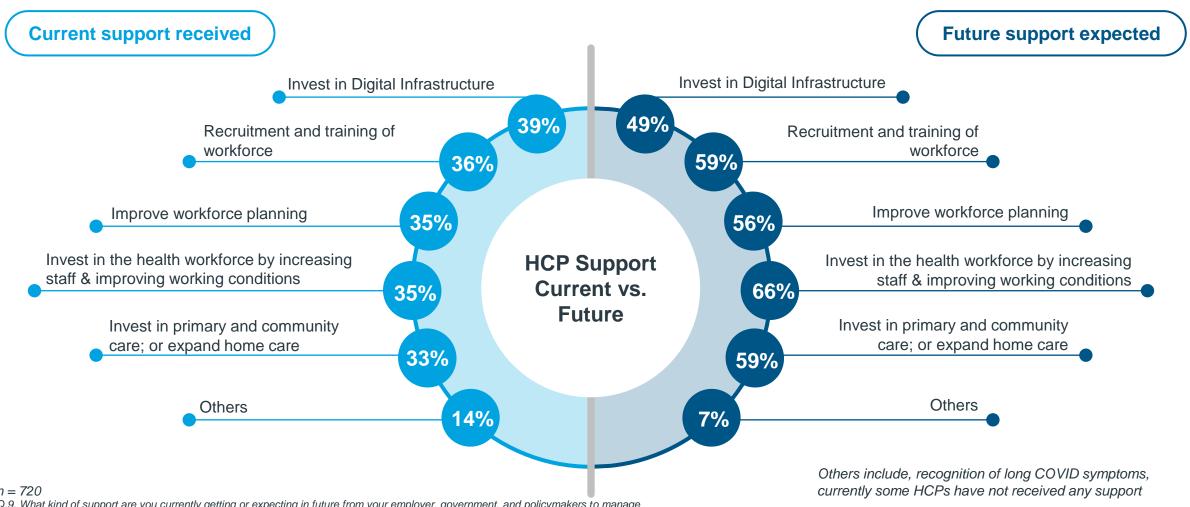

Q.8. Who do you think can support yourself and other healthcare professionals to address and ease the burden of the COVID-19 on you and the healthcare system?

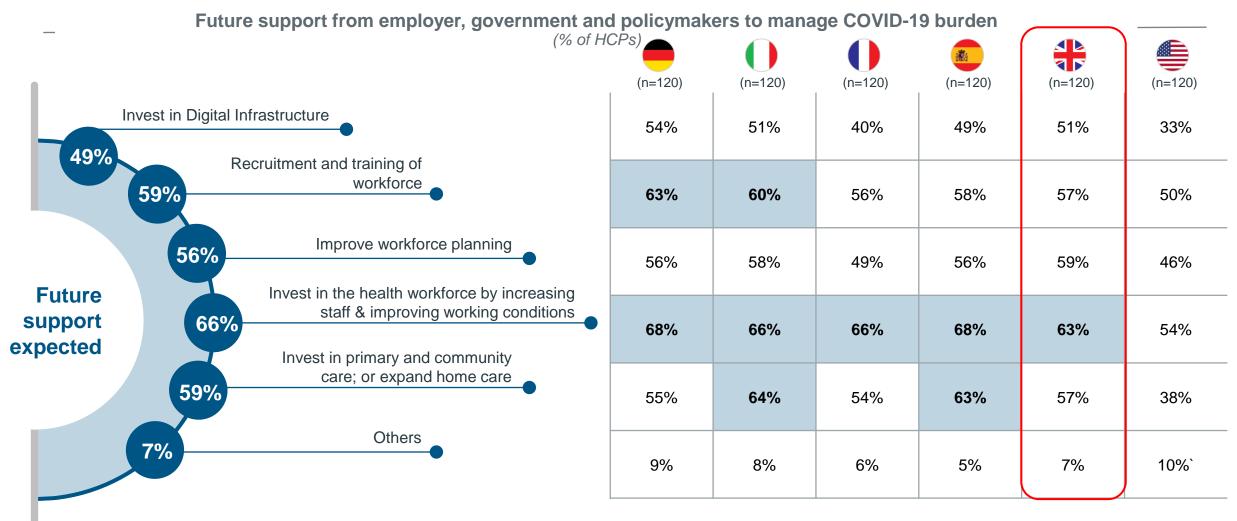
There is a significant gap in the support HCPs report receiving and in the support they expect

Better compensation and more support staff are the major expectations from government

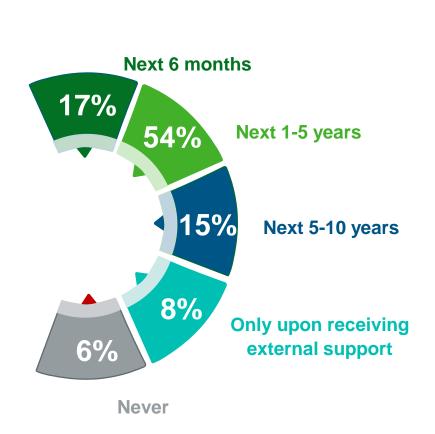

Summary



The majority of UK physicians surveyed report increases in patient caseloads. This increase is largely driven by still unresolved patient backlogs from the pandemic.



Patient backlogs and lack of staff due to resignation and burn-out are also the primary factors impacting health services outside of COVID-19.



Workforce shortage along with patient backlogs and an uncomfortable working environment are also the main stressors reported



While results from other countries are similar, UK respondents report back higher levels of these issues.



When it comes to support received and expected, NHS doctors are more aligned with their colleagues from other countries



Expectations of support are mainly directed towards government and policy makers and center on investment in the workforce.
